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The Impact of Your Support

CNIB's evaluation team regularly assesses the impact our programs have through a Common Outcomes Survey Tool. Each youth sets their own goals depending on what they would like to achieve through CNIB programs. Outcomes are always evaluated according to participants' personal goals. Youth have told us that through their participation in CNIB programming, they have achieved the following:



- Youth learn new skills and abilities or improve existing skills and abilities
- Youth experience reduced stress or anxiety
- Youth spend time with friends, meet new people, and get involved in their community
- Youth receive support for their educational and employment goals
- · Youth receive the help they need to maintain their independence











Sarnia-Lambton Learns About **CNIB Technology**

Through a wide range of innovative programs, CNIB empowers Canadians with sight loss to





Technology programs are especially popular among participants in the Sarnia-Lambton community. Here are some of the programs young participants in Sarnia-Lambton engaged in thanks to your support:

Phone it Forward

CNIB's Phone It Forward program in Sarnia-Lambton provides accessible smartphones to individuals with sight loss, helping them stay connected with loved ones and access important services through accessible features like screen readers, magnification, and voice commands.

Tech Talk Tuesday

Tech Talk Tuesday offers a virtual platform for Sarnia-Lambton residents and beyond where they can learn about accessible technology, get expert guidance, and share their experiences, ensuring participants can confidently navigate their digital world.

CNIB SmartLife Programs and Drop-Ins

Whether Sarnia-Lambton residents would like to visit their nearest CNIB SmartLife Centre, the London Community Hub or would like a visit to their home, CNIB offers the Sarnia Lambton community one-to-one accessible tech support. CNIB SmartLife provides the opportunity to explore and receive hands-on guidance on using accessible technology for daily tasks, from smartphones to smart home devices, fostering greater independence and inclusion.

Wireless Wednesday On Wireless Wednesday, CNIB offers Sarnia-Lambton residents free, interactive sessions to explore mobile device accessibility features, helping participants maximize the use of smartphones and tablets in their everyday lives.

CNIB Come to Work



Thanks to you, young people who are blind, low vision or deafblind in the Sarnia-Lambton area are equipped with the tools, confidence and skills to pursue and succeed in meaningful employment opportunities.

CNIB's Come to Work program connects job seekers aged 15 to 29 with blindness, deafblindness, or low vision to employers seeking untapped talent. With over 1,400 participants nationwide, including nearly 100 youth in Ontario, the program offers tailored support and specialized training. Unlike other vocational providers, CNIB's program is uniquely designed for individuals with sight loss.

Come to Work programs play a vital role in helping young people who are blind, low vision, or deafblind navigate the challenges of the job market. In 2024, participants in Sarnia-Lambton engaged in tailored workshops that covered essential skills like resume building, job interview preparation, and workplace communication. These skills help youth prepare for their first jobs and teach them about self-advocacy, which is crucial in overcoming barriers they might face due to their sight loss.



Sarnia-Lambton Goes to Camp @ CNIB Lake Joe

For over 60 years, CNIB Lake Joe has offered enriching camp experiences for Canadians with sight loss, empowering them to shine and reach their full potential. Located on Lake Joseph in Muskoka, it is Canada's only fully accessible camp for people who are blind, deafblind, or low vision. Each year, hundreds of campers enjoy activities like swimming, sailing, canoeing and campfires.



For many children and youth, including those from Sarnia-Lambton, attending CNIB Lake Joe's camps is life-changing. With tailored programming, participants gain essential skills in a supportive, inclusive environment, often discovering new interests and their full potential for the first time.

Some of the impactful camp programs that children and youth in Sarnia-Lambton have participated in include:

Youth Leadership Development

Participants engage in activities that enhance leadership skills, teamwork, and problem-solving abilities. Camps at CNIB Lake Joe like **Leadership Camp** provide invaluable experience that helps youth grow into confident, capable leaders both at camp and in their communities.

Sports and Recreation

Camps like **Pushing Limits for Active Youth (PLAY)** and **Camp Abilities** provide fun opportunities for children and youth with sight loss to explore new sports and get active. Participants learn or develop their skills in 5-a-side soccer, tennis, blind hockey, rock climbing, archery and watersports.

Outdoor Fun & Adventures

At CNIB Lake Joe, youth enjoy outdoor activities such as hiking, canoeing, kayaking, swimming and so much more! These experiences help to build confidence and independence while embracing the 'magic' of camp just like their sighted peers.

Mobility & Orientation

Programs like **Buddy Dog Camp** are available to help children and youth with sight loss develop skills in mobility, and adaptive techniques. These sessions are integral to fostering greater independence and self-sufficiency in daily life.

And so much more!

CNIB Lake Joe also provides opportunities for those who are interested in Braille Literacy, children and their families to enjoy Summer Camp, and a variety of adult camps.

Beyond the skills and fun memories gained, you help children and youth with sight loss gain a sense of belonging and community at CNIB Lake Joe. Many participants feel a tremendous sense of comfort and relief from being around other people with lived experience. Thanks to you, children and youth from Sarnia get to feel seen and have access to an environment in which they can thrive.

At the very end of our first day at camp, [my son] whispered, "Everyone here is just like me." I strongly believe, in that moment, he was giving himself permission to step away from the stresses he surrounds himself with and all of the variations of self-doubt he inundates himself with because of his lived experience.

Lake Joe allowed him to let go of all of that. Lake Joe allowed him to be the regular kid he's discovering he actually is. I watched him take risks and push himself unlike any other time before because Lake Joe was the safe place he needed to make that happen."

CNIB Kids – Inclusive and Accessible Education Project



Inspiring Change in Classrooms Across Canada

CNIB Kids - Inclusive and Accessible Education project was designed to teach educators and students how to foster inclusion in the classroom for people who are blind or low vision. Thanks to your support, CNIB developed educational resources which helped to increase participants understanding of blindness, the importance of creating more accessible and inclusive schools and how to support people who are blind or low vision across the province.

School Presentations and Toolkits

With the help of donors like you, over **2000 students, parents and school staff** in **72 school boards** from across Ontario—including **Lambton Kent District School Board**—received CNIB presentations, all led by CNIB staff and volunteers with lived experience with sight loss and toolkits, which included the following:

- Information on how to make school communities inclusive for students who are blind or low vision, including a short video.
- Units and lesson plans on accessibility, inclusion, braille and more.
- Tips for recess, gym, class trips and more.
- A picture book with corresponding lesson plans that link to the Ontario curriculum.
- A booklist that includes characters who are blind or low vision for primary, junior and intermediate readers.

It is also worth noting that although these workshop presentations focused on the experience of people with sight loss, post-presentation, students discussed other disabilities they live with freely and without stigma. Bullying was an important topic of post-workshop discussion as well, with many students sharing their experience and ways to overcome bullying and build a more accessible school environment.



At the Viscount Alexander Public School presentation in Ottawa, it was shared:

I liked the slide show and all the artifacts they brought in. Allowing students to feel the Braille book at the end was useful for our ESL learners."
